

The Middle Years Programme (MYP)

- All students entering Hugh Boyd in grades 8 to 10 learn through the MYP.
- Students are at the centre of learning by:
 - drawing connections between all subject areas,
 - learning is explicitly linked to the world around them,
 - participating in a foreign language is required, and
 - a variety of formal and informal assessments are used to inform teaching and learning.

The Middle Years Programme (MYP)

A unique feature of the programme is that it extends the traditional curriculum to include immersion in four themes:

 approaches to teaching and learning, global contexts, and concepts.

Students also complete a personal project in Gr 10, which is an independent piece of work that may be an artistic production, or another form of expression.

Incentive 8 Program

- Challenges motivated students to achieve academic and personal excellence.
- Students in each grade will study Language & Literature Inc (English 8), Individuals & Societies Inc (Social Studies 8) and Sciences 8 Inc in an environment designed to challenge them.
- Students must be independent thinkers, risk takers and possess critical thinking and creative problemsolving skills. Also, they must have a strong work ethic and a positive attitude.


