BC Graduation Literacy Assessment 12

ALL GRADE 12's please note that completion of the Graduation Literacy Assessment 12 is a graduation requirement. All Grade 12's will be scheduled into an assessment sitting during the week of January 24, 2022. The assessment is 2 hours long, with an extra hour of time offered for those who require it.

Note that students who have not yet completed the **Graduation Literacy Assessment 10**, or the **Graduation Numeracy Assessment 10** will also be required to write these and achieve a holistic score of 1 to graduate. Flu Season and COVID 19

The flu season has started, and the continuing COVID-19 pandemic has made this season more complicated. Influenza (Flu) and COVID-19 are both contagious respiratory illnesses but are caused by different viruses. While COVID-19 seems to be spread more easily than the flu and causes more serious illness in some people, we should not underestimate and overlook influenza. Flu illness is caused by highly contagious influenza viruses that can spread rapidly. Viruses can live for up to 48 hours on the surfaces of doorknobs, computer keyboards, and other hard surfaces. It can take up to a week for flu symptoms to appear, and in that time, you can infect others. To reduce the risk of spreading the virus, it is good practice to cough or sneeze into your sleeve (not your hands) and to wash your hands often with soap and hot water. In fact, frequent hand washing with regular soap is the single most effective way of controlling the spread of infections. Staying home when you are sick with flu symptoms and getting yourself vaccinated also helps to protect those around you. Supporting Families in Need

Hugh Boyd has a strong tradition of helping others, and this year around the holidays (especially with the damage and dangers caused by the floods in the Fraser Valley and all around British Columbia), we will be involved in giving again. The Student Council have annual fundraisers that raise money and awareness for those who are less fortunate, but this year, we will have to do some different events, due to the restrictions in place due to COVID. The Student Council is organizing this year's <u>Breakfast with Santa</u>. There will be music and videos, hot chocolate, elves, Santa and food.

The Interact club has just finished a very successful **24 Without** campaign, raising and having to go an entire 24 hours without food, technology or makeup. **'24 Without'** is an event organized by the grade 10 incentive class and where the money fundraised goes toward **Refilwe**, a village in South Africa. To date, the money fundraised by Hugh Boyd goes toward education efforts, building schools and libraries, and providing books and supplies. It also provides support to the village through the development and maintenance of a water filtration system, industrial kitchen, food tunnels for growing crops, and construction training centers. Through **'24 Without'** students do not eat, use technology or makeup for 24 hours to experience the life of those who do not have the same privileges and resources that we do, while also participating in an event full of fun games and speeches. This year we have fundraised around **\$2000**.

The Interact club is also fundraising to support **Operation Christmas Shoebox**, an initiative where we gather supplies and resources such as toiletries, socks, gloves, toques, and other winter items for emancipated youth, ages 16-18. We have hot-chocolate fundraisers and donation collecting this week, and all proceeds go to Operation Christmas Shoebox.

Hugh Boyd also promotes the efforts of the **Richmond Gives Richmond Cares** organization who hopes to brighten the holidays for families in need. MYP at Hugh Boyd

A Guide to Finding What You Need to Know

IB: MYP is a bit of a trendsetter. Much of the new BC Curriculum is very similar to what we have been doing here at Hugh Boyd for the last decade. Still, despite sharing core ideas, values and even assessment methods, our language/jargon may vary from what you've heard in other schools. We thought we'd make you aware of some of the resources available through the Hugh Boyd Secondary website to help you navigate these differences and learn how the MYP program works here at Boyd.

While this page <u>https://boyd.sd38.bc.ca/ib-middle-years-programme/teaching-and-learning-myp</u> provides a good snapshot of the MYP at Boyd, your first and best resource is the Parent Handbook which gives a clear overview of the MYP Programme. You can find a copy to download here:

One of the most common questions we get is around assessment. Essentially, rather than receiving a score based on a random number of points, each subject area in the MYP is divided into skill/content areas that are separately assessed to help determine areas of strength and areas for future growth. Each is graded using an 8-point rubric that spans the range of not yet meeting necessary outcomes to working expertly in that area. One way that we make learning accessible and allow for connections to the greater world is by teaching using lenses that let us choose what to focus on so we can better direct learning and so that students can make meaningful and purposeful connections to the bigger picture of Life, The Universe and Everything. The Global Contexts allow students to connect knowledge and skills to a broader world of learning, including the ongoing learning that will extend beyond their high school career. SUPPORTING CHILDREN AND YOUTH DURING NATURAL DISASTER EVENTS

Natural disasters include hurricanes, earthquakes, tornadoes, wildfires, tsunamis, and floods, as well as extreme weather events such as blizzards, droughts, extreme heat, and windstorms. These events can lead to many adversities for children and families, including displacement, loss of home and personal property, changes in schools, economic hardship, loss of community and social supports, and even the injury and death of loved ones.

Tragic or traumatic occurrences can alter a person's sense of security. We know that children may be upset or have questions about what has taken place. The first and most important support for children and youth are their family. Below, is a list of ways that we can work together to create a safe environment for children and youth during this difficult time.

Be reassuring. Children take their emotional cues from the significant adults in their lives. Your reactions are most important. Recognize that some children may be concerned about something bad happening to themselves, family or friends. Explain to them the safety measures in place and reassure them that you and other adults will take care of them.

Be a good listener and observer. Let children guide you to learn how concerned they are or how much information they need. If they are not focused on the tragedy, do not dwell on it. However, be available to answer their questions to the best of your ability. Young children may not be able to express themselves verbally. Pay attention to changes in their behaviour or social interactions.

Monitor the news. Images of a disaster or crisis event can become overwhelming, especially if watched repetitively. Young children may not be able to distinguish between images on television and their personal reality. Older children may choose to watch the news but be available to discuss what they see and to help put it into perspective.

Emphasize people's resiliency. Help children understand the ability of people to come through a tragic event and go on with their lives. Focus on children's own competencies in terms of how they previously coped in their daily life during difficult times. In age-appropriate

terms, identify other critical incidents from which people, communities, or countries have recovered.

Highlight people's compassion and humanity. Large-scale tragedies often generate a tremendous outpouring of caring and support from around the country and world. Focus on the help and hopeful thoughts being offered to those affected by other people.

Maintain as much continuity and normalcy as possible. Allowing children to deal with their reactions is important but so is providing a sense of normalcy. Routine family activities, classes, after- school activities, and friends can help children feel more secure and better able to function.

Spend family time. Being with family is always important in difficult or sad times. Even if your children are not significantly impacted by this tragedy, this may be a good opportunity to participate in and to appreciate family life. Doing things together reinforces children's sense of stability and connectedness.

Ask for help if you or your children need it. Any tragedy can feel overwhelming for families directly affected, particularly those who have lost loved ones. Staying connected to your community can be extremely helpful. It may also be important to seek additional support from a mental health professional to cope with overwhelming feelings.

Communicate with your school. Children directly impacted by the event may be under a great deal of stress that can be very disruptive to learning. Together, parents and teachers can determine what extra support or leniency students need and work with parents to develop a plan to help student.

Be aware of your own needs. Don't ignore your own feelings of anxiety, grief, and anger. Talking to friends, family members, religious or cultural supports and mental health counselors can help. It is important to let your children know that you are sad. You will be better able to support your children if you can express your own emotions in a productive manner. Get appropriate sleep, nutrition, and exercise.

Boyd Diversity Book Challenge The Library Learning Commons has kicked off its first Boyd Diversity Book Challenge in all Block C classes. See below for more information!

What the Book Challenge is:

After conducting a district wide diversity audit of secondary library collections, we found that about 20% of the books sampled for the audit were from diverse authors, while about 30% were from diverse protagonists. According to the 2016 Census, about 76.3% of the population in Richmond are visible minorities. The Boyd LLC have been making significant efforts to re-balance our collections to better reflect our community and reflect students' diverse experiences. It is a work in progress. We want a fun and inclusive way to get all students to read and value diverse works and authors of all backgrounds.

What it isn't:

Wokeism, Tokenism, Virtue Signaling, Performative Allyship, or prioritizing one perspective over another. It is taking the active steps to build empathy, share experiences, learn, and grow.

What is its significance?

According to Rudine Sims Bishop, in her paper Mirrors, Windows, and Sliding Glass Doors, books are sometimes windows that offer views into the world that may be real or imagined, familiar or strange. These may not be experiences that students have had themselves, but they are able to gain insight into a another space and place. With imagination, these windows can sometimes be sliding glass doors, through which they can become a part of the world that has been created by the author. In certain lighting conditions, a window can also be a mirror that reflects the experiences in literature back to us, so we can see our lives and experiences as part of the larger human experience. For a long time, many students have not been able to find many stories that reflect their lives and experiences. "When children cannot find themselves reflected in the books they read, or when the images they see are distorted, negative, or laughable, they learn a powerful lesson about how they are devalued in the society of which they are a part" (Bishop, 1990). We are trying to change this by constantly reviewing and evaluating our collection, finding where the gaps are, and purchasing works that reflect the diverse nature of our community. We also want students, staff, and all adults of our school to value these books and the perspectives they offer.

How will Boyd Diversity Book Challenge work?

- in Block C classes
- Semester 1: Nov 23rd to Jan 17th
- Semester 2: Feb 7th to Apr 5th
- Class party for most # of books read per class AND for the class with fewer than 15 students but read the most per capita
- Weekly draw prizes
- Individual prizes for students who read the most books-3rd, 2nd, and 1st place!
- Students can choose any graphic novel, novel, or non-fiction book labelled "Boyd BC" in a yellow dot
- Labelled for diverse authors/perspectives
- Fill out the provided ballot and put into the class container or drop it off in the library
- Repeat for as many times as students like
- Multiple entry points for students of all abilities-everything counts!



APPLYING TO COLLEGES AND UNIVERSITIES

Begin accepting applications on a specific date and cut off applicants once a program is full so the earlier you apply, (as soon as it opens and not before), the better.

Universities Begin accepting applications in Sept/Oct. and consider each application based on a specific set of course/grade criterion, not necessarily how early you've applied. They stop accepting applications on a specific date.
