The late return form (can be found on the school website) is to be completed for any student(s) who expects to return to school **LATER THAN 12:00 pm Wednesday, Sep. 7, 2022**. Please complete this form and return to the school principal before **June 24, 2022**. If a student is **not** returning on or before **September 16, 2022**, a school cannot reserve a spot guaranteeing the ability to be enrolled in the school. There may be a need for placement at another school upon the students’ late return.

In the event of an unforeseen critical family circumstance occurring on or after July 1, 2022, that causes an unexpected late return to the school, the parent must advise the school as soon as possible by email via the school website or by letter directed to the Principal.

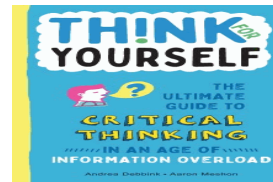
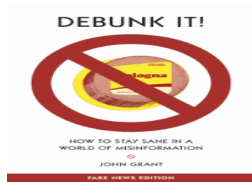
Final Return Dates for Library Materials:

Resources for Media, Digital, and Information Literacy:

Did you know we have lots of resources for students to help them understand the world around them? Whether it's monitoring social media/cell phone use, debunking false information, or how to plow through myriads of information out there in this age of information overload, we have materials for students and guardians to check out. As a teacher librarian, it is my role to teach these skills to students. I am often able to do so through classes that come down for lessons on information literacy and research. However, these skills are best practiced when all stakeholders are on the same page in guiding students through these turbulent times. The following resources are just some that are available for loan:

- **They're watching you: personal privacy on social media** by *Alexis Burling*
 - Explores the various ways to be safe on social media, including being smart about personal privacy
- **True or False: A CIA analysts guide to spotting fake news** by *Cindy L. Otis*
 - Explores the history of fake news and how to spot it.
- **Debunk it! How to stay sane in a world of misinformation** by *John Grant*
 - In an era of misinformation, much of it spread by authority figures, apps and websites, it is difficult to know what is true. The author uses contemporary, ripped from the headlines examples to clearly explain how to identify bad evidence and poor arguments, summarizes the rhetorical tricks people use to mislead, and offers advice about how to deal with people who intentionally misinform.
- **You're addicted to your phone: how to break the habit** by *Taylor Morris*
 - Explores how to wean teens off constant phone use, including the physical and emotional repercussions.
- **Think for yourself: The Ultimate Guide to Critical Thinking in an Age of Information Overload**
 - Shows how to think more deeply about your own life and current events. You'll learn how to ask questions, analyze evidence, and use logic to draw conclusions so you can solve problems and make smart decisions. All it takes is a little curiosity and an open mind!

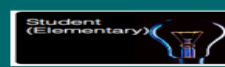
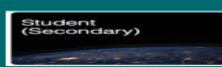

5. Enter your Education Number (PEN number) and Personal Info and click Continue 6. Enter the Account Info, and agree



APPLYING TO COLLEGES AND UNIVERSITIES

Not too late to apply to a college. Check program requirements and apply ASAP!

Most university deadlines have now passed but some may still be accepting applications. Please check with the specific institution's website before applying or see Ms Jones.

Most universities will have separate deadlines for documents, grades, transcripts, and addition information required for admission. Please check their website for more information on these upcoming deadlines.

SENDING GRADES TO POST-SECONDARY

All students should have now completed their Student Transcripts Service (STS) Online Choices Form. The STS is an online service for students to view their marks, scholarships, and transcripts, and send transcripts to post-secondary institutions. To access the service, visit the Ministry of Education's Order Transcripts and Certificates website [HERE](#). **IMPORTANT NOTE!** For those student's applying to Ontario Institutions, make sure you have listed OUAC (Ontario University Application Ctr) as one of your options on the student transcript form.

OFFERS OF ADMISSION

Grade 12 students, who have applied to a university/college for entry in Sept. are reminded to regularly check the institution's secured student website/portal for new messages. Many sites require students to use the Identification Number that was noted on their confirmation letter or email, along with a password. These sites contain important details regarding transcript submission, self-reporting, admission offers, course pre-requisites, registration, deadline dates, contact information, grades, etc.



ACCEPTED YOUR OFFER: NOW WHAT?

Check your emails for next-steps instructions – pay attention to deadlines – each university will have a specific deadline to accept an offer, apply for residence and more! - Make sure you follow your post-secondary school's instructions exactly and pay your deposit to confirm acceptance. Many colleges and universities offer workshops for new students, these workshops will teach you about: ~First year course planning - registration "how-to's. ~Tips for success ~Campus Services & more.

RICHMOND DISTRICT CAREERS PROGRAMS (GRADE 10-12)

NOTE: Although the application deadline for Youth Train in Trades Programs has passed, some programs may still have spots. Please see your counsellor or career advisor ASAP if you are interested in either plumbing or cooking

- The Career Programs Office offers students in Richmond School District with opportunities to explore a variety of career options while still in high school. Whether students decide to pursue college, university or work after high school, these options open doors and allow students to:
 - get a head start in a chosen career path while still in high school
 - acquire skills relevant to today's labor market needs
 - have flexibility and choice with respect to how, when and where learning takes place
- The *Youth Train in Trades* programs offer hands-on skills acquisition through post-secondary technical training to students in grades 11/12 (apply in grades 10/11). The first level of tuition is FREE (savings of ~\$2500-4000) - paid for by the Richmond School Board.
- The *Youth Work in Trades* program means students aged 15-19 "*earn while they learn*", acquiring high school credits and industry credentialing in recognized trade, while in high school.
