

NOTICE OF LATE RETURN



Our first day of school will be **Sept. 6th, 2022**. If you cannot attend on the first day of class, Please complete this “*Notice of Late Return*” form and email it back to Boyd at boyd@sd38.bc.ca

The late return form (can be found on the school website) is to be completed for any student(s) who expects to return to school **LATER THAN 12:00 pm Wednesday, Sep. 7, 2022**. Please complete this form and return to the school principal before **June 24, 2022**. If a student is **not** returning on or before **September 16, 2022**, a school cannot reserve a spot guaranteeing the ability to be enrolled in the school. There may be a need for placement at another school upon the students’ late return.

In the event of an unforeseen critical family circumstance occurring on or after July 1, 2022, that causes an unexpected late return to the school, the parent must advise the school as soon as possible by email via the school website or by letter directed to the Principal.

HAVE A SAFE AND HAPPY SUMMER!

TIMETABLE STRUCTURE FOR 2022-23

The Hugh Boyd Timetable Structure for 2022-23 has been decided. Boyd will be using a **Semester model** (4 classes for half the year, then 4 new courses in the second half). Start and end times remain **8:30 AM** and **3:00 PM** with 10 minutes between classes and a **45-minute lunch**. **Personalized Learning Time** will return to Boyd, offered from **8:30-9:25 AM** on **Tuesdays and Thursdays**, where students can get additional help from the teacher(s) of their choice. Greetings from the Hugh Boyd Music Department



It has been an exciting and eventful time in the Boyd Music Department over the past month. The bands and choir performed energetic and inspiring concerts at Gilmore and Dixon Elementary Schools and at the Boyd *Biennale* Fine Arts Night, which was a great success. Thank you to everyone who came out to support the Boyd musicians, artists, and actors at the *Biennale*; it was so great to see so many members of our community observing and appreciating the talents of our students.



VALEDICTORY PERFORMANCE

A small group of grads (vocalists *Sarah Luong, Chloe Lau, Kyla Medalla, and Isabella Ramos*, and drummer *Lennox Wong-Chor*), combined with some strong Grade 11 musicians (*Tylor Choy* – piano, *Emma Murray* – bass, *Clarence Palome* – guitar), made up this year's Valedictory Ensemble. The group rehearsed multiple times a week leading up to their valedictory ceremony performance at the Chan Centre on June 4th. They played a stirring rendition of "*Don't Dream It's Over*," a 1986 breakout hit by Australian band, Crowded House, that was more recently covered by Ariana Grande and Miley Cyrus. It was an unforgettable experience for these musicians to perform on a world-class concert hall stage and it was a real treat for all in attendance to hear them play. **Bravo!**

EMERGING COMPOSER, EMMA MURRAY, WORKS WITH THE HARD RUBBER ORCHESTRA

Emma Murray is a very inquisitive and curious Grade 11 music student who has been working on her composition skills over the past couple of years. Recently, she was selected to participate in this year's "*Emerging Composers*" event hosted by Vancouver's **Hard Rubber Orchestra**, and she was the youngest of all the composers involved. At the event, Emma had her original composition, "*That's One Cool Dinosaur*," a sizzling Salsa tune, read and recorded by the 10-piece **Hard Rubber Orchestra**, which is made up of some of Vancouver's top jazz musicians. Prior to that, Emma received private lessons with Vancouver bandleader and composer, Jill Townsend, and with Montreal-based saxophonist and composer, **Christine Jensen**. This was such an incredible opportunity for Emma to meet and mingle with some of Canada's "best and brightest" and we are all very proud of her. **Way to go, Emma!**

YEAR-END CONCERT

The year-end concert was held on the evening of **Wednesday June 15th** and it was fantastic to have such a supportive crowd for who the Boyd ensembles could perform. We certainly have missed these important live-music connections over the past couple of years, so this concert felt particularly special. Highlights included the **Choir's** performance of "*In A Sentimental Mood*" arranged in an Afro-Cuban style by our very own, **Emma Murray**; The Second Line Band that featured young talents from our nearby elementary

schools; The **Drumming Ensemble's** performance of a Son Montuno piece they call "*Montuno Maravilloso*" featuring members of the **Jazz Band**; some fantastic and creative jazz performed by the **Jazz Combo**; "*Don't Dream It's Over*" performed by the **Valedictory Ensemble**; The **Jazz Band's** smoking rendition of the standard, "*Softly As In A Morning Sunrise*"; The **Concert Band's** performances of "*Led Zeppelin on Tour*" and their effervescent encore, "*Stevie Wonder in Concert*," a medley of Stevie's greatest hits. It was a wonderful evening of music, and it never ceases to amaze me how our school, though relatively little in population, is so rich in musical talent.

THE FUTURE...

I am very sad to say "farewell" to Boyd after 8 years of running the Music program but I'm also feeling invigorated with the possibilities that lie ahead as I move to McRoberts. Working with the staff and students at Boyd has been incredibly rewarding and I feel like I've become a better teacher, musician, and human because of my experiences here. The Boyd music program is super diverse, and it has certainly kept me on my toes, with the classes ranging from Drumming to Jazz Band to Music Composition to Guitar... Over the last 8 years I've come to know that the Boyd community is overflowing with kindness and compassion and that the Boyd music students have a great abundance of soul and a willingness to work hard toward a common goal – making beautiful music. These attributes are what make the Boyd music program successful, and I know that the Boyd musicians will continue to do great things for years to come. Thank you, students and families, for all your well-wishes and I hope to hear about your achievements in the coming years (yes, let me know about your admission to Law School! I'd love to know these things!).

I am very pleased to let you know that my brother, **Ryan Naso**, will be running the Boyd music program starting next year. This is great news because he has all the skills and experience needed to teach the courses offered at Boyd and he also already knows many of the students. I know he is very excited to work with the Boyd students and I am hopeful that we can find ways of connecting the McRoberts and Boyd programs somehow. Stay tuned!

Summer Checkouts:



Despite this being the third year of pandemic-affected learning, it has been a successful one for the Hugh Boyd Library Learning Commons. We hosted General Student Council meetings in the library, weekly Book Club discussions, an Indigenous Drum Making session, and countless classes. We ran the inaugural Boyd Diversity Book Challenge over two semesters, and prepared activities for the whole school for the National Day of Truth and Reconciliation on September 30th, Black History Month in February, National Poetry Month in April, Asian Heritage Month in May, and National Indigenous History Month in June. APPLYING TO COLLEGES AND UNIVERSITIES

Not too late to apply to a college. Check program requirements and apply ASAP!

Most university deadlines have now passed but some may still be accepting applications. Please check with the specific institution's website before applying or see Ms Jones.

Most universities will have separate deadlines for documents, grades, transcripts, and addition information required for admission. Please check their website for more information on these upcoming deadlines.

SENDING GRADES TO POST-SECONDARY

All students should have now completed their Student Transcripts Service (STS) Online Choices Form. The STS is an online service for students to view their marks, scholarships, and transcripts, and send transcripts to post-secondary institutions. To access the service, visit the Ministry of Education's Order Transcripts and Certificates website [HERE](#). **IMPORTANT NOTE!** For those student's applying to Ontario Institutions, make sure you have listed OUAC (Ontario University Application Ctr) as one of your options on the student transcript form.

OFFERS OF ADMISSION

Grade 12 students, who have applied to a university/college for entry in Sept. are reminded to regularly check the institution's secured student website/portal for new messages. Many sites require students to use the Identification Number that was noted on their confirmation letter or email, along with a password. These sites contain important details regarding transcript submission, self-reporting, admission offers, course pre-requisites, registration, deadline dates, contact information, grades, etc.



ACCEPTED YOUR OFFER: NOW WHAT?

Check your emails for next-steps instructions – pay attention to deadlines – each university will have a specific deadline to accept an offer, apply for residence and more! - Make sure you follow your post-secondary school's instructions exactly and pay your deposit to confirm acceptance. - The Career Programs Office offers students in Richmond School District with opportunities to explore a variety of career options while still in high school. Whether students decide to pursue college, university or work after high school, these options open doors and allow students to:
 - get a head start in a chosen career path while still in high school
 - acquire skills relevant to today's labor market needs
 - have flexibility and choice with respect to how, when and where learning takes place
- The *Youth Train in Trades* programs offer hands-on skills acquisition through post-secondary technical training to students in grades 11/12 (apply in grades 10/11). The first level of tuition is FREE (savings of ~\$2500-4000) - paid for by the Richmond School Board.
- The *Youth Work in Trades* program means students aged 15-19 "earn while they learn", acquiring high school credits and industry credentialing in recognized trade, while in high school.
- Throughout the school year, the Career Programs Office strives to engage students, educators, parents, and the Richmond community to learn more about the skilled trades and other career areas by offering a variety of professional learning opportunities, activities, and events. Our office is available for classroom presentations and can facilitate student try-a-trade experiences at various post-secondary schools. (Currently, these are virtual.)
