Camryn Rogers, local alumni and olympic gold medalist, returned to Mcmath with Justin Trudeau earlier this September. Camryn Alexis Rogers is a track and field athlete, born and raised in Richmond. She started athletics at the age of twelve, joining the "Richmond Kajaks Track and Field Club" team. Two years after throwing a hammer for the first time, she achieved a gold medal in the women's hammer throw at the BC highschool track championships. One year later, in 2016, she broke the Canadian youth and junior hammer throw records. In 2017, while attending McMath Secondary, she won gold again at the BC highschool track championships. As she graduated, and moved on to the University of California, Berkeley, she continued to excel in her competitions, with many notable hammer throw accomplishments. Heading into the 2024 Paris Olympics, Rogers became the first Canadian female gold medalist to win an individual track and field event. Prime Minister Justin Trudeau visited Mcmath with alumni Camryn Rogers to recognize her with her latest Olympic accomplishment. Rogers is a local inspiration to many young student athletes, and she will continue to break records and encourage others to do the same.

HARRIS VS TRUMP: WHAT COULD'VE BEEN IN 2020
