CANADA'S IMMIGRATION LAWS

In recent months. Canada has introduced significant changes to its immigration laws, as the federal government looks to balance immigration levels with domestic pressures facing Canadians. As a result of this, the IRCC (Immigrants, Refugees, and Citizenship Canada) has decided to reduce the number of Non permanent residents (NPRs) in Canada, which includes bringing the number of work and study permit holders down from 7% to 5% of Canada's total population by 2026.

to transition to permanent residency, we will have more domestic draws for us and ask provinces and territories taking part in the Provincial Nominee Program to do the same with their allocations," said the Immigration Minister, Marc Miller on March 21st, 2024.

From 2025 to 2027, Canada will be bringing a total of 1.1 million new permanent residents (PRs). A 21% drop from previous years. The government said the plan "will pause population Canadian goods. The previously mentioned growth in the short term to achieve wellmanaged, sustainable growth in the long term".



TRUDEAU'S RESIGNATION

Under growing unpopularity, Prime Minister Justin Trudeau has decided to give up his position as Canada's leader. He intends to resign when the meticulous process of selecting the Liberals' new party leader is completed on or before the general election on October 20. Some potential candidates include former Deputy Prime Minister Chrystia Freeland, former Central Banker Mark Carney, Minister of Innovation François-Philippe Champagne, former BC Premier Christy Clark, Foreign Minister Mélanie Joly, MP Chandra Arya, and Frank Baylis. All of them seem like a much-needed upgrade from "As part of our efforts for temporary residents Trudeau. Leader of the Conservatives, Pierre Poilievre commented, "Nothing has changed," following up with, "Every Liberal MP and Leadership contender supported EVERYTHING Trudeau did for 9 years, and now they want to trick voters by swapping in another Liberal face to keep ripping off Canadians for another 4 years, just like Justin."

Another factor that influenced his decision was the potential threat of American President Donald Trump imposing taxes on imported Chrystia Freeland criticized Trudeau for not taking the proper steps towards mitigating this risk. The Liberal Party is hoping that choosing a new leader will get them out of political tensions, however, this depends on whether they win the election or not.

Currently, the Conservatives are in the lead by around twenty percent according to national polling averages. According to election simulations run by CBC, Poilievre has a near ninety-nine percent chance of winning. Anything could happen at this point, and Canada looks like it has a bright future to come.

LOS ANGELES FIRES

While first responders and firefighters grapple with the wildfires as they tear through Los Angeles, citizens and families scramble to safety. Southern California is currently facing multiple wildfires, with the most significant being the Palisades fire. Since January 11, the fire has expanded to over 23,000 acres of the Palisade neighbourhood, forcing approximately 30,000 residents to evacuate their homes, and threatening more than 13,000 structures. This disaster has sadly claimed the lives of at least 27 individuals so far, and 36 others have been reported as missing.

Additionally to the Palisades fire, the Eaton fire in Altadena has covered around 14,000 acres, and the Hurst fire north of San Fernando, though mostly contained at 799 acres, still poses some risks. The repercussions of the fires have given way to secondary hazards, including mudslides caused by water runoff from the firefighting efforts. These incidents have raised concerns about the safety of the fire-burnt areas and the potential for more disasters. The insured losses from last week's fires exceed \$20 billion, and the total economic losses may reach \$50 billion.

The firefighters' efforts are huge, involving support from across North America and including teams from Canada, Mexico, and the Navajo Scouts. The personnel teams set up command posts around the city, providing essential services and working behind the scenes to support the extensive operations. Meanwhile, thousands of firefighters immerse themselves amongst the heat of the blaze, working tirelessly to maintain the flames. Most of the fight is from above, in planes and helicopters, where water bombs and fire retardants are dropped. Despite all this, containment of the wildfires remains a challenge due to California's dry conditions and extreme winds. Nevertheless, Californian communities exhibit resilience as they work together to aid the tragedies.






